Jef was previously the Director of the Collections Service and also assisted Freddy with some of the Distinctions Service tasks. We wish him the best of luck in continuing such a demanding task.

The XXXVI FIAP Congress will also be remembered for another transition in the important role of FIAP Vice President, from Freddy Van Gilbergen to our friend David Tay Poey Cher.

David is a prominent figure in the history of our organization. He was the first Asian member to join the FIAP Board of Directors, and now he reaches an even more significant milestone, becoming the first Asian Vice President in the history of the Federation.

This moment is not only symbolic but represents a fundamental step toward an even more inclusive and representative future for our Federation. His experience, vision, and dedication will undoubtedly be invaluable in addressing the challenges and seizing the opportunities that lie ahead. At the same time, this appointment acknowledges the growing role of Asia within our Federation and

reflects FIAP's ongoing globalization, strengthened by its embrace of diversity and international collaboration as core values.

For many years, David has successfully served as the Director of the Promotion and Partnership Service, excelling in building connections and fostering international collaborations critical to the future of photography.

Equally significant was the election of Paul Stanley, Director of FIAP Photo Academy Online Events, Director of the FIAP Exhibition Center in Dublin, and Liaison Officer for Ireland, as a member of the FIAP Board of Directors. Over the past few years, Paul has managed FIAP's numerous online events with excellence, achieving remarkable success and significantly contributing to the global outreach of our activities. This consistent commitment and the strong following he garnered likely secured his narrow victory by just five votes over the other candidate, Ahmed Albusaidi, Director of the FIAP Youth Service, Director of the FIAP Exhibition Center in Muscat, and our Liaison Officer for the Sultanate of Oman.

Both candidates represent individuals of great talent and he was elected FIAP Vice President capability, and we expect significant contributions from both in the years to come. Paul, with his expertise in managing and innovating online events, and Ahmed, with his dedication and vision for engaging younger generations, will undoubtedly play key roles in our development.

This outcome is not just a personal success for Paul but also a recognition of the extraordinary work done by both candidates. FIAP is fortunate to rely on talents of this calibre, and I am confident that together, they will strengthen our Federation and help it grow even further.

Other significant moments of the XXXVI FIAP Congress included the General Assembly's approval of amendments to the FIAP Statutes, a crucial step necessitated by the new legislative requirements of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg, under whose jurisdiction FIAP operates. This statutory adjustment is an essential milestone in ensuring that our Federation has a solid legal foundation aligned with international regulations, further strengthening its credibility and integrity.

Equally noteworthy was the presentation of the stunning new volume dedicated to FIAP Biennials, masterfully curated by Biennials Director Luis Franke. This work is a visual and cultural tribute to the extraordinary artistic quality and diversity of the FIAP Biennials, a meticulously crafted volume celebrating award-winning works and bearing witness to FIAP's contribution to promoting artistic photography on a global scale.

Undoubtedly, one of the most anticipated moments of the XXXVI FIAP Congress was the presentation of the new FIAP Distinctions regulations, led by the new Director of FIAP Distinctions, Jef Lemmens, and the Director of FIAP Patronages, Romain Nero. This was a central and highly relevant moment for the Federation's future, sparking great interest and intense debate among participants.

It should be noted that the proposed regulation is not yet final. The central issue, concerning whether to include

print admissions in the new system, generated an in-depth and lively discussion during the General Assembly. Despite the delegates' active participation and commitment, no unanimous decision was reached. As a result, it was decided to refer the matter to a referendum, ensuring the direct and democratic involvement of all FIAP Operational Members. This approach guarantees that every opinion is considered, and that the final decision truly reflects the collective will of the Federation.

In the coming days, Secretary General Ioannis Lykouris will send an official form to all Operational Members, allowing them to express their positions. This process represents an essential step, as the final decision will significantly impact the structure and evolution of FIAP Distinctions. With this initiative, the Federation reaffirms its commitment to a participatory and transparent approach, ensuring that every voice within the FIAP community is heard and that the resulting regulation meets shared needs and expectations.

Finally, among the numerous topics that will be detailed in the General Assembly report sent to you by the Secretary General, two deserve special mention: the assignment of the next FIAP Photo Meeting to the People's Republic of China, to be held in the beautiful region of Hunan in late August, and the assignment of the next FIAP Congress to Brazil in August 2026.

These are two highly significant events, not only for their intrinsic importance but also because they highlight, on the one hand, China's undeniable organizational capabilities, having already hosted the unforgettable 2017 Photo Meeting, and on the other, marks a historic moment for our Federation, with the XXXVII FIAP Congress in Brazil becoming the first FIAP Congress ever held in Latin America.

A heartfelt thank you to both countries, and best wishes to all for a 2025 full of health, happiness, and achievements.

Page A must be signed by the person in the nation's Photographic Federation who is responsible for the initial administration of these applications within the country. Page B must be signed by the applicant for the Distinction.

The 2025 closing date for MFIAP Applications is the 1st February. The portfolio of photos for MFIAP applications is to be lodged in digital format only, not as prints.



Promotion and Partnership Service Beijing International Photo Week 2024

On 19 October 2024, China's capital Beijing ushered in the annual feast of images; the Beijing International Photography Week. Often called Photo Beijing, in short, and billed as one of the largest international photography events, the opening was held at the China Millennium Monument. More than 800 Chinese and foreign photography guests, photography enthusiasts and media reporters from more than 20 countries attended the opening ceremony.

This annual event was co-organized by the Ministry of Culture and Tourism of the People's Republic of China, the Beijing Municipal People's Government, the China Art Photography Society, the China Photographers Association, the China News Photography Society, the China Photo Group and the Beijing Gehua Cultural Development Group.

The opening ceremony kicked off with the red-carpet ceremony

where the invited guests took a walk on the red carpet before taking their seats. It was followed by speeches delivered by Yang Yuanxing, Executive Chairman of the Beijing International Photography Week 2024 Organizing Committee and Lifetime Honorary Chairman of the China Art Photography Society, and Riccardo Busi, President of the International Federation of Photographic Art (FIAP).

Yang Yuanxing led in pressing the "Start Button" with the following persons to officially open ne event:

- Zhu Xianmin, General Advisor of the Beijing International Photography Week Expert Advisory Committee and Honorary Chairman of the China Art Photography Society;
- Lan Hongguang, Vice Chairman of the Beijing International Photography Week 2024 Organizing Committee and President of the China News Photography Society;
- Huang Wen, Deputy Secretary-General of the Beijing International Photography Week
 2024 Organizing Committee, Member of the Party Committee and Vice President of
 Xinhua News Agency China Photo Agency;
- Ju Yang, Member of the Party Leadership Group and Secretary-General of the China Photographers Association;
- Qi Yongqing, Deputy Secretary of the Party Committee of Beijing Gehua Media Group Co., Ltd;
- Riccardo Busi, President of the International Federation of Photographic Art (FIAP);
- Manolis Metzakis, President of Global Photographers Union (GPU); and
- Yoo Soo-chan, Chairman of the Korean Photo Writers Association, jointly pressed the start button.

Yang Yuanxing, Executive Chairman of the Beijing International Photography Week 2024 Organizing Committee and Lifetime Honorary Chairman of the China Art Photography Society then announced the opening of Beijing International Photography Week 2024.

The academic theme for this year's event was "Image: Life - Eternity" with 15 theme-exhibitions and 43 parallel exhibitions showcasing more than 5,400 works by more than 2,600 photographers with the China Millennium Monument as the main exhibition venue linking to 11 other exhibition areas, including the Art Museum, Beijing Wukesong International Photography Cultural Garden, Central Academy of Fine Arts, Beijing Film Academy, Beijing Institute of Graphic Communication, Beijing Institute of Fashion Technology. Photography Week makes full use of the rich cultural and artistic space of the capital Beijing, and through the new form of "images depicting the capital city map", realizes its own public cultural construction function, better meets the spiritual and cultural needs of the general public, and provides citizens and tourists with a unique image art journey, forming the most powerful promotion for Photo Beijing 2024.

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

FIAP World Cup for Clubs Service

19th FIAP World Cup for Clubs 2024

L had the honour and pleasure of organising the 19th FIAP World Cup for Clubs. The time for clubs to upload their photos has just ended and from the 15th to 17th December there will be an online judging for awarding the prizes.

While we wait to find out who the winners will be, I would like to take this opportunity to remind you that just before the opening of this edition of the FIAP Word Cup for Clubs, the new regulations of this prestigious competition were published, which introduced several interesting new features. I have worked hard on the regulations of the FIAP World Cup for Clubs over recent months with a dual purpose: to make this important event more attractive, thereby encouraging ever increasing participation in the

future, and to better ensure compliance with FIAP regulations by the participating clubs.

In particular, I have focused on improving protections for this significant photographic contest against the forms of file manipulation, including of course the creation of images by artificial intelligence, which are strictly prohibited, even in an open theme such as the one set for the FIAP World Cup for Clubs. For this purpose, I have also discussed the matter with the Director of the FIAP Ethics Service, as well as with the members of the FIAP Board of Directors, and this led us in particular to insert the following new paragraph in Section 3 of the regulations:

"The person representing the club (namely the one that will be in charge of submitting the files that will participate in the competition) is responsible for collecting the submitted files, which must contain the original EXIF data. This person must also collect at the same time from the authors all the RAW files of the submitted images or the original unmodified jpg files. In the latter case he/she should also request the images taken immediately before and after the submitted image.

This person must retain all these images (RAW + JPG series), without any exception, in case they are requested for possible inspection, without expiration, prescription or limitation of FIAP actions.

These files can be requested by Director of FIAP World Cup for Clubs or by the FIAP Ethical Service from the person representing the club at any time. In case one (or more) file is requested, the person representing the club must send it immediately within 10 days of their request. If the file is not sent and received within the deadline, the submitted image will be disqualified."

Furthermore, in order to have even more fair and representative judging, the number of effective judges foreseen for the FIAP World Cup for Clubs has been modified. Instead of only 3 judges, there can now be from a minimum of 3 up to a maximum of 5. The higher number may be dependent upon availability.

To make the competition more attractive and interesting, three new individual prizes have also been introduced, consisting of 3 special prizes relating to themes that will be determined from year to year. In the case of the 2024 edition, the special prizes are for: the best landscape photo, the best portrait photo and the best architectural photo.

I would also like to point out that, in an effort to ensure greater variability in the awarding of the Maurice Dorikens Trophy, from year to year, the calculation criteria for its assignment have been modified.

Finally, in order to promote the FIAP Club World Cup and make it even better known throughout the world, the FIAP Board of Directors decided to allow all clubs in the world (not only ILFIAP clubs) to participate free of charge in the 2024 edition of this competition. So, no entry fees were required from any photographic clubs in the world that participated in the 19th FIAP World Cup for Clubs 2024.

For details of the changes described above, I refer you to the document DOC 042/2024 (in particular sections 3, 4, 6 and 8), which was approved by the FIAP Board of Directors and constitutes the new regulations for the FIAP Club World Cup currently in force.

FIAP Audiovisual Service

Lt is always exciting to leverage the photographs of the FIAP collection to create an audiovisual work. There are plenty of works from photographers from all over the world who have participated in competitions with FIAP patronage. This constitutes a unique opportunity to see how the different thematic areas are addressed by authors from different nations and cultures.

Creating an audiovisual that summarizes a photographic theme in a few minutes with so many images available is not easy. There are two fundamental objectives to respect: to make the viewing pleasant and at the same time guarantee the best viewing of the works, clearly attributing the author's credits.

The other determining aspect is that an audiovisual work must blend images and music in a harmonious and synergic whole, where the visual and sound components support each other. For this reason, the choice and combination of the soundtrack is a fundamental activity.

In this spirit, the work of the FIAP Audiovisual Service continues, with the release of two new audiovisuals:

- "Music Lovers" where photographs relating to the theme of "Music" are collected: instruments, players, concerts, environments, fantasies on the musical theme.
- "Sport@Water" a selection of images related to water sports, where all the energy of these athletes emerges in contact with this fantastic natural element, which they know how to tame with their strength and skill.

he normal quarterly timetable for FIAP News will resume in 2025 with four editions per year, in February, May, August and November. The details for submitting articles are routinely located at the rear of the magazine in every edition and can also be found in the documents located on the FIAP News Service page. The publishing schedule, together with the relevant closing dates are shown on that page. This has been updated to show the 2025 schedule.

The first edition for 2025 is in February. As the December edition has been published a lot later than planned, information about the February edition was sent by FIAP Mail and the normal closing date was extended.

There will be some changes to the sections we have in the magazine in 2025. The section for Articles won't be resuming. The commercial magazines cover this type of content well. Instead, we have the introduction of our Youth Photographers Gallery Section which has commenced in this December edition. This celebrates the photography of our younger photographers. With the growing number of FIAP Exhibition Centres, it is also anticipated that this section of the magazine will grow, sharing some of the photos shown in the exhibitions held in these galleries. It is hoped that every FIAP Exhibition Centre will send an article about their activities at least once a year. It is also anticipated that the FIAP Events section will likely increase in size as new initiatives such as FIAP Photo Days and other events increase in number. It would be great to regularly receive articles from our FIAP Exhibition Centres and Operational Members about their activities from 2024 and for 2025 in upcoming editions.

The Affiliates Section is predominantly for FIAP's Operational Members to write the story of their special activities each year and share photos taken by their members at these events. It is inspiring to share ideas and see the activities conducted in other countries. It would be great to have an article from each of our Operational Members for this section every one to two years. Whilst articles from ILFIAP's and organisers of events held under FIAP Auspices will also be considered for this section, these will only be published at the discretion of FIAP News, where deemed of special significance and interest for our FIAP Community. No more than one article per year will be published from one organiser or ILFIAP in this section (FIAP Exhibitions Centres are not limited by this and have their own section in FIAP news).

The Recommendations section will resume as a place for FIAP Photographers to recommend places and events for photography, sharing their personal insights as a photographer into the best location and best times for photographers to be in these places. Any photographer can send articles for this section as per the information in the "Submitting Articles" page at the rear of the magazine.

I would ask contributors to the magazine to submit their articles as early as possible to avoid the last minute rush near the closing dates. As always, the FIAP News team will work with authors to ensure the article is presented in excellent English. Many articles start as texts translated using internet translators which are a great tool and a good base from which the FIAP News team are able to make amendments to present the articles well. So, publishing articles from people who speak a language other than English is not a problem, just part of the FIAP News team's routine processing of articles. Don't let a language difference prevent you from being involved in FIAP's magazine!

The 36th FIAP World Congress 2024

Among FIAP's various initiatives, the World Congress is one of its most popular events. This year, India had the privilege of hosting the World Congress of FIAP.

The 36th FIAP World Congress took place from November 1st to 7th, across three iconic cities in India: Jaipur, Agra, and Delhi. It brought together **229 participants** from **39 countries**, offering a perfect blend of cultural exploration and photographic opportunities. Originally planned for 2020, the event was postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. With the 2022 host country already decided, India embraced the opportunity to host this grand event in 2024, showcasing its rich cultural heritage and warm hospitality.

Day 1: Arrival in Jaipur & Night City Photography

The first day was a whirlwind of activity, with delegates arriving and registering throughout the day from all over the world. The FIAP Board of Directors arrived earlier and held their meetings prior to the Congress activities commencing.

Once the registration formalities were completed, the evening activities began with a captivating night photography session where participants explored the illuminated cityscapes of Jaipur. This was during the Diwali Festival, the Hindu Festival of Lights, so buildings and streetscapes were vibrantly lit. This outing included viewing the facade of Hawa Mahal, a palace in the city. Attendees had the opportunity to capture the city's vibrant atmosphere through street photography, allowing us to freeze the beauty of Jaipur's streets and culture. The day concluded with an authentic Rajasthani dinner, followed by engaging cultural shows at the hotel lawn.

Day 2: Jaipur City Tour & Cultural Performances

The second day saw the FIAP Board, FIAP Liaison Officers and some other delegates from nations hold a day of official meetings. The other Congress attendees embarked on a fascinating tour of Jaipur, the vibrant capital of Rajasthan, visiting its iconic landmarks. We explored the majestic Jal Mahal, Jantar Mantar, Albert Hall Museum, Birla Temple, City Palace and captured the city's essence through street photography. Our knowledgeable guide enlightened our delegates with fascinating stories about the rich history of the place, including its cultural significance and architectural details.

Upon returning to the hotel, we had a demonstration by Mr Tikam Chand, a master photographer renowned for his expertise in traditional photography using a plate camera. He graciously shared his camera with the delegates, allowing us to experience the art of photography using this vintage equipment. We were even able to take photographs and print them on the spot.

That evening, the Congress was formally inaugurated with the traditional Indian ceremony of lighting a Diya by the FIAP Board Members and our secretary of FIP. A brief address by Riccardo Busi paved the way for the entertainment program of traditional folk dances and Grand Gala Dinner. The energetic beats of Indian music soon had many people up dancing.

Day 3: Pushkar Excursion

On November 3rd, we embarked on a journey to Pushkar, a revered pilgrimage site. Pushkar is also renowned for its annual camel fair, which attracts visitors from far and wide. To avoid the crowds, we arrived at the Mela ground a few days prior to the fair.

Day 4: Amer Fort Visit & Award Ceremony

On November 4th, delegates visited Amer Fort and other famous landmarks. Delegates rode up the hill to the fort on elephants and spent time taking photos and enjoying the breathtaking views. This outing also included a step-well shoot with models After returning to the hotel, a vintage car photography session with models was held at the Royal Orchid Hotel. The events of that evening were the inauguration of the exhibition of the Black and White Biennial, the Awards Presentation event for the Biennial and the presentation of the FIAP Best of the Best Author for 2022.

The Award night was set up on the lawn. We were mesmerized and inspired by the speech of Dr. Diana Chan, who received the prestigious 'Best of the Best Award 2022' from FIAP. She shared many of her remarkable photographs with us during her presentation. The Award night and opulent Mughlai dinner in the hotel garden also included an Indian classical dance performance. A write up and photos from the opening of the exhibition of the Black and White Biennial will be in the February edition of FIAP News.

Day 5: Agra Journey & Krishna Leela Performance

The journey to Agra began early, with a stop at Bharatpur for lunch, a heritage resort. Upon arrival, participants were treated to a Krishna Leela performance on the hotel lawn.

Our Radha and Krishna models added a pop of color and joy as they playfully celebrated Holi, surrounded by vibrant flowers and colors. We arrived at Agra in the evening and ended with a traditional Indian dinner.

Day 6: Taj Mahal & Farewell Dinner

The next morning was a predawn start as we visited the iconic Taj Mahal at sunrise, capturing its unparalleled beauty.

In the afternoon, Congress participants explored Agra Fort. Some participants then went to Mehtab Bagh whilst the FIAP Board, Liaison Officers and some other delegates held their final administrative meeting in the late afternoon.

As the program came to a close with the farewell dinner the atmosphere was filled with a mix of emotions; sadness to bid goodbye, yet gratitude for the unforgettable experiences and connections made. The evening commenced with bestowing of Service Distinctions by the FIAP and some awards from FIAP and the FIP. Secretary General of FIP, Dr Barun Sinha, was bestowed a token of appreciation 'Reconnaissance Recognition' plaque from FIAP for the hosting of the FIAP Congress.

Mr Freddy Van Gilbergen from Belgium became the Director of the FIAP Distinction Service in 2005 and was appointed as a Vice President of FIAP in 2014. The Federation of Indian Photography conferred the Hon. FIP on him in recognition of his dedication to the art of photography. Mr Adit Agarwala, President of FIP, presented the memento.

We would like to also acknowledge a truly exceptional individual, David Tay. Notably, he was elected as the Vice President of FIAP at the elections, held during the administrative sessions of the Congress, and has the distinction of being the first Asian to be included as a board member of FIAP (Fédération Internationale de l'Art Photographique), a testament to his outstanding contributions to the world of photography.

Day 7: Delhi Exploration

The final day the group travelled back to Delhi. This day included visits to Humayun's Tomb and Qutub Minar in Delhi.

Day 8: Departure For Respective Countries and Post Tours

Bidding farewell to some of the delegates was tough. Despite being together for just a few days, strong friendships had formed. We exchanged our emails, WhatsApp and Facebook information to keep this friendship alive.

Whilst many delegates headed for home or onward travel, two groups headed for the optional post tours. These tours went from the 8th-11th November. One went to the Tiger Safari at Tadoba Tiger Reserve where the group participated in seven safaris. The other group did a Dunes & Desert Safari with Forts & Havelis. This saw them fly to Jodhpur to see the Blue city and fort, then travel by bus to Jaisalmer where they visited Dahisar Lake at sunrise, Kuldhara and the Khuri sand dunes. This last one for both sunset and sunrise photos with models and camels.



36th FIAP Black and White Biennial, India 2024

In 2024 the 36th FIAP Black and White Biennial was conducted in India. India was also hosting the FIAP Congress 2024. The FIAP Operational Member for India is the "Federation of Indian Photography" (FIP).

We are very grateful to all the participants of this Biennial. We had a great number of countries participate; 44 countries coming from five continents participated, and we received 440 prints. The Black and White Biennial only has one section, a print section.

The judging was completed on the 11th August in the city of Kolkata. The FIP had taken a huge Conference Hall at the Lemon Tree Hotel in this city for two days. The judges were: Luis Franke (Argentina), Francis Nicoll (Belgium) and Pandula Bandara (Sri Lanka). The appointed jury member of the FIAP Board of Directors was David Tay Poey Cher. For personal reasons he could not be present, so Luis Franke took his place as substitute.

In the days before the judging, the FIP had organised photo shoots at various locations near

Kolkata to welcome the jury and other members of the team of organisers.

The judging of the collections was done in two steps:

- 1. the judging of each work in the collection, completed on Saturday 10 August
- 2. the judging of the coherence of the collection, held on Sunday 11 August

The total score of a collection was obtained by the addition of the points from the two different judgements.

The winner of the World Cup was France. The medal winning countries were Oman, Germany and Russian Federation. The HM's were obtained by Ireland, Italy, India, Spain, Bahrain and Belgium.

Other than the awards for the winning country teams, eleven individual awards, six FIAP medals and five awards offered by the organiser, were given to the top photographs.

The images entered by the top four countries, the photographs that won the individual awards and some pictures from the judging are shown with this article. The full results are published on the FIAP website:

The Russian Federation was awarded the Grand Prize "Dr. M. Van de Wijer" 2024.

This award has been given every two years since 1980 to the best placed country in the combination of the two sections of the Colour Biennial plus the Black & White Biennial. They won the Silver Medal in the print section and the World Cup in the digital section in the Colour Biennial 2021 and won the Bronze Medal in the Black and White Biennial 2024.



Showcase of MFIAP Distinctions Recipients for 2024

Each year the International Federation of Photographic Art (FIAP) honour eminent personalities known in the field of photography for their artistic work. These honours are known as FIAP Distinctions.

The Artist, and subsequent Excellence and Excellence Levels Distinctions, are gained by achievements in International Exhibitions that have been organised under FIAP Patronage. Once a person has gained their EFIAP, they can continue to gain EFIAP Levels but also have another path. They can seek their Master Photographer of FIAP referred to as "MFIAP".



The "Master Photographer of FIAP" (MFIAP) Distinction is awarded to a photographic artist in recognition of his/her entire achievements in the field of artistic photography. MFIAP is the third step, after AFIAP and EFIAP, in the FIAP distinctions awarded for personal successes in photography.

The candidate must have been the holder of the EFIAP distinction for at least 3 years before they are eligible to apply. For this Distinction, the applicant is required to submit a portfolio of 20 images. This collection of images must be coherent from its conception to its realisation and presentation. Text that describes the subject and the creative concept of the photographic artist must accompany the images. All images are submitted as digital files. The portfolios were examined by an international panel of Master Photographers and the final decision then made by the FIAP Directory Board using the advice of the panel. The Distinction is awarded by a majority vote of the FIAP Directory Board.

In 2024, there were 22 applicants for MFIAP, from 18 countries, of which three were successful. In the following pages of FIAP News we are showcasing the successful applicants and a selection of the photographs from their MFIAP portfolio. A link to their complete portfolio is also provided.

Insects The Little Strangers

define myself as a predator of moments. I collaborate with entities, magazines and promoters in my city Bilbao.

I started this project during the pandemic and I am currently developing it. Isolation in my country house allowed me to discover an unknown world in my photography such as extreme macro. After reading and watching tutorials I decided to take the leap and enter this fascinating and complex world. Little by little I bought everything

I needed, lenses, tripods and electronic rails. For example, I use a Sony Alpha 7R IV with specific Macro lenses: I really like the Laowa ones, they are inexpensive and of great guality. From 5x

Macro lenses; I really like the Laowa ones, they are inexpensive and of great quality. From 5x magnification onwards I use microscope lenses adapted to the camera, for example Mitutoyo 10 x, and 50 x. At those magnifications you have to work with great precision.

The photographs you are going to see are not taken at random, they are the result of many hours of study and dedication. For this type of photography, it is impossible to obtain an image with the sharpness that I show you in a single shot, it is necessary to perform the stacking technique. Some of the photographs are taken in nature with a rail, moved manually and placed on the tripod, although the number of shots is lower and the quality suffers. In nature you should always photograph before the sun comes out since many of the insects cannot fly yet due to the cold, or are in a state of lethargy, which is appropriate for this type of photography.

The most extreme photos are taken in a photographic studio with a more sophisticated electronic rail than the manual one and with light systems and diffusers. Here the number of photos increases significantly as well as the quality of the final photograph. There are tables to determine (according to the lenses used) the distance to travel, the interval and number of shots to take.

Each photograph that you can see is composed of more than 100 images, in some cases up to 200, to achieve the quality shown. Once I have the entire sequence of photos, each with a part of the subject in focus, they are merged with a program - I use Zerene Stacker.

I then transfer the generated TIF to Photoshop and refine the photograph, removing imperfections or dirt on the sensor, and I also apply certain techniques that I have gradually taught myself over the years. I do them as a sequence of actions to achieve the finish I am looking for. I use luminosity masks to increase or decrease the light or colour in certain areas.

My photography in general is characterised by bright and sometimes contrasting colours and with a lot of definition, not only in macro photography but in the photography in general that I take, sometimes closer to the unreal or to a comic.

My aim is to value and discover the beauty of the small things that are imperceptible to most of us. I do not intend to show the essence of nature but to make art and that is how they should be contemplated and valued.

For example, the two beetles facing each other as if it were a boxing match with their antennae as gloves remind us of that being in the Ridley Scott film ALIEN?

In short, get close to these insects and be amazed by their beauty and uniqueness.

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In the Stillness of Time

A have always been inspired by writers. Particularly writers who make me think about things in new ways. Writers such JB Jackson who regarded the landscape as 'a rich and beautiful book that is always open before us. We have but to learn to read it'. And there are Japanese philosophers who use the term 'wabi sabi' to encapsulate the 'beauty of things humble and impermanent' and suggest that 'things are either devolving towards, or evolving from, nothingness, as everything wears down and eventually wears out'. Somewhere in the back of my mind these writers undoubtedly planted a seed, which ultimately grew into this project.

Laurie Campbell

Joining Catchlight CC ignited my passion for seeking out new challenges, and over the years, I have found success in many salons

and exhibitions. Not being the most confident person, it took several nudges, from those who know me well within the club, to persuade me to try for the MFIAP. And now I am one of only two people in Northern Ireland to hold this distinction.



When I headed to Canada to see family in the Autumn of 2021, I wasn't even thinking about photography, let alone thinking about creating a successful body of work. I had been waiting for the country to open up after the Covid lockdown, but the first weekend after I landed, the country went back into lockdown again. I guess things happen in life for a reason and it's about recognising an opportunity when it arises. It was only through pure serendipity that, what was supposed to be a short trip to South Western Ontario in Canada, turned into a 4 month stay and culminated in this body of work which gained the MFIAP. This was the first time I had visited this rural part of Canada in several years, and I was immediately struck by the changes in the farming landscape - old familiar farm structures were no longer there. And 'barn raising', the traditional way in which the farming community came together to build these structures, and which created and reinforced a sense of community cohesion, was disappearing.

The project was not without its challenges, not least the coldest weather I have ever experienced with wind chill down to -30 degrees. At times both my camera and I struggled with the sub zero temperatures. But for me, what started as a walk into the countryside, turned into a quest to record the changing face of the farming landscape, through the changing fortunes of those traditional farm buildings.

A sense of their growing impermanence or 'placelessness' was evident to me on this trip to Canada. Where once they stood centre stage, now they occupy mostly peripheral or marginalised spaces, in a sort of 'no-man's land'. Visible but invisible, valuable but not valued. No longer fit for purpose and too expensive to maintain, many have been abandoned, repurposed, or have lost their sense of place. Many now face an uncertain future, while others await the arrival of the developer's bulldozer. I am not a documentary photographer, nor do I see myself as a landscape photographer. But I wanted to capture the essence of this vulnerability and quiet solitude. The panel I produced is my way of preserving the 'what was' before the transition to the 'what next'.



Life in the Mundari Camp

When I started taking pictures in 1985, I never thought I could achieve such important results. Before photography I practiced athletics. I was a decent 800-metre runner. The competitive aspect was very important and it also was in photography. I participated and won the most important competitions in the world, including the first prize at the Hamdan International Photography Award (HIPA) in Dubai.

Photography encouraged me to travel a lot and look for something exclusive in my reportage, seeking something that others had not done. In this case the work on the Mundari is not particularly exclusive, because it has become fashionable to go to

South Sudan. But for me it was an incredible experience and the portfolio created allowed me to achieve my MFIAP.

In March 2023, I encountered the primal ethnic group of the Mundari. Their lifestyle is completely dedicated to the care of their large-horned cows, the Ankole-Watusi, also known as "the king's cattle". The Mundari sleep among their cattle, lying close to the piles of dung that braise and smoke 24 hours a day. The heat warms their nights outdoors. The Kalashnikov AK47, always at their side, serves as a deterrent for cattle thieves. The day at the Mundari camp begins very early, at the first light of dawn, when the youngest have the task of milking the cows. At this time it is easy to see boys having breakfast drinking milk directly from the udder of the cow. It is a daily practice to wash with cow urine as its antibacterial property is considered an antiseptic against infections and the ammonia present has a coloring effect on the hair, making it red-orange. This colour is a boast and a sign of purity for the Mundari. Around seven in the morning, the herds leave to reach the pastures. And it is precisely now that the hardest work begins for the remaining boys. Their task is to collect the dung deposited during the night. This operation is of vital importance for the community and the collected dung is deposited on piles scattered throughout the field. Under these piles a continuous ember causes the dung to burn very slowly creating a dense and acrid smoke that floods the entire field. The result is an almost unreal atmosphere where the silhouettes of men enter and exit from dreamlike scenes and the backlit sun rays color the entire environment red and orange. This is a fantastic situation for a photographer, in front of whom daily life situations appear immersed in almost unreal scenarios.

During the hottest hours of the day, activities calm down and those who have remained at the camp rest in the shade of large trees. During these breaks, the men smoke a characteristic pipe obtained from a hollowed-out pumpkin to which a sort of mouthpiece is applied to the end. A small brazier containing the tobacco is applied to the pot-bellied part. Another relaxing activity is head massages using sand as if it were shampoo.

When the sun is about to set, the field is filled with sounds, drums and horns warning that the herds are returning. Taking photographs when they return is one of the things that excited me the most. I climbed onto small wooden scaffolding to get a better perspective and pointed the lens towards the sunset in the direction where the dust raised by the cows was taking on colour. The large crescent-shaped horns could be glimpsed and the sharp tips created a surreal scene.

As soon as you return home from a trip like this and start looking at the photographs, you want to leave again because the impression is that you haven't managed to capture all the aspects. Maybe next year I'll return for a new experience.

his international photo competition is the first of its kind initiated by the International Federation of Photographic Art (FIAP) with the objective of attracting the young generation photographers. Undoubtedly, it was the most significant event FIAP has ever organized for young people under the age of 25 with the purpose of:

- inspiring the creative enthusiasm of college students around the world;
- promoting the prosperity and development of photographic art worldwide;
- strengthening exchanges and cooperation between colleges and universities in various countries; and
- enhancing the goodwill and friendship between college students in the world.

The competition has no theme and no restrictions on photography categories. It is open to students of universities or academies regardless of nationality, race, and religion. The participating universities or academies must be recognised by the governments of their countries, and have the right to grant photography degrees. Each participating university/academy is limited to submitting up to 20 works by a maximum of 5 students under the age of 25 (born after June 30, 1999).

The top three individual prize winners received cameras worth \$3,000, \$2,000, and \$1,000 respectively.

The Dean/Director of the top three universities/academies together with the top three individual prize winners were invited to China from 9 to 21 October 2024, including international flights, domestic transfers, accommodation, and full board, to participate in:

- Lishui FIAP World Photographers Conference;
- The Awards Ceremony in Jinan;
- Photo Beijing 2024 (one of the largest international photographic events);
- A one-day workshop in Jinan with two prominent National Geographic photographers: Manoocher Deghati and Tom Ang.

A portfolio of 15 images for each of the top winners was exhibited during the Awards Ceremony in Jinan, and will be exhibited in all 27 FIAP Exhibition Centres in 2025.

his section aims to showcase the work of young photographers, providing a platform for their talent and creativity.

Any photographer who is under 25 years of age is invited to send photos they have produced for possible inclusion in this gallery. Photos being sent will need to be submitted by the closing date that applies to each edition of FIAP News as shown in the rear of the magazine. Details regarding sending photos to this section of FIAP News are as follows.

Submission of Photos for the Youth Photographers Gallery

- 1. Photographer must be under 25 years of age as of the closing date for the FIAP News edition to which the photos are being submitted.
- 2. Each photographer may submit a maximum of 3 photos.
- 3. Photos are to be 1024 pixels on the longest dimension, 96 ppi, sRGB colour space and saved as the highest quality jpgs.
- 4. There is no set subject. Images can be colour or monochrome.
- Strictly no nude photography. 5.
- All components of the final photo, and modifications of the final photo, must be the work 6. of the photographer, eg no clipart, no other person to work on the photo, no photos that have AI created components.
- 7. Photographers under the age of 18 must have the consent of their parent or legal guardian to send photographs for possible publication in FIAP News.
- Photographers must send the following with the photographs
 - a. Photographer's name
 - b. Photographer's date of birth and age as of the closing date for the FIAP News edition.
 - c. The country in which the photographer resides
 - d. A title for each photo or short text about the photo (35 words maximum).
 - e. If the photographer is under 18 years of age, an "Author's Agreement Form for Minors", signed by a parent or legal guardian, must be sent.
 - f. Photographers who are 18 years of age or older must sign and submit the adult "Author's Agreement Form".
- 9. Ensure that where any recognisable people are featured in the photos, that they (or their parent/guardian, if they are under 18) have given their permission for the photo to be published in FIAP News. Please read the FIAP News Regulations before signing the Author's Aareement Form.
- 10. The "Author's Agreement Forms", and the FIAP News Regulations to which these forms apply, can be downloaded via https://www.fiap.net/en/services/fiap-news-service
- 11. The photos, plus the required information and the applicable Authors Agreement form, must be sent to the Director of FIAP News using the file transfer service: https://wetransfer.com/ The email address to which the transfer should be directed is fiapnewsdirector@gmail.com
- 12. Any questions regarding submission of images for this section should be sent to the FIAP News Director at fiapnewsdirector@gmail.com

This is not a competition. There will however be a selection made to ideally show photographs from photographers of different ages and from different countries. Technical image guality will be a consideration, but the concepts and composition will be prioritised as appropriate for the photographers age. The photographers name, age, country and the title of the photo (or text, as per point 8.d above, if provided) will be published with the selected photos.

Requirements for Articles Submitted to FIAP News

Criteria for Articles

- Articles should be no more than 1500 words.
- FIAP Events section is exempt from word limit.
- Article must be typed in English language and provided in an electronic document that can be opened in Microsoft Word.
- Do not send the articles in PDF format!

Photos for Inclusion With Your Article

- Maximum of 25 photos. (Banners and logos are welcome and not counted as a photo).
- FIAP Events section and Directors Notices are exempt from limit on number of photos.
- Must be provided as separate files, not embedded into article.
- Must be 1024px on longest dimension, regardless of photo orientation.
- Must be provided in sRGB colour space and saved at the highest quality jpg setting.
- A list of the image files must be provided with any applicable text that is to accompany each image, eg who and what is shown in photo. This list can either be at the bottom of the article or provided in a separate document.
- Images must be of a good quality and edited for best presentation, eg colour, cropping etc.
- If the position or order of the photos in your article is important, please put the file name in red text between paragraphs in your article and we will endeavour to place it there. Depending on page layout, it may not always be possible to place the photo exactly where you would like it.

** Please understand that the images you send may not always all be included. Space, layout, suitability for all readers and quality will be considered. ** Articles for the "Recommendations From a Local Photographer" mini article section are to be a maximum of 400 words and two photos. Up to five photos may be sent, to provide choice.

Submission of Articles
